World Diabetes Awareness Day - November 14

World Diabetes Day, observed annually on November 14, serves as a global awareness campaign aimed at highlighting the growing prevalence of diabetes and its impact on individuals and communities.

In 2024, the theme is "Breaking Barriers, Bridging Gaps," which emphasizes the importance of equitable access to diabetes care and support for all individuals living with this condition. This theme resonates deeply within the Christian community, encouraging collective action to foster well-being among those affected by diabetes.

Understanding Diabetes in the Christian Context

Diabetes is a chronic condition that affects how the body processes glucose, leading to various health complications if not managed properly. The Christian community plays a vital role in promoting health and wellness through teachings that emphasize care for one's body as a temple (1 Corinthians 6:19-20). This perspective encourages believers to adopt healthy lifestyles that include balanced diets, regular physical activity, and proactive health management.

The statistics surrounding diabetes are alarming; millions of people worldwide face daily challenges related to this disease.

Many experience distress and emotional burdens stemming from managing their condition. Fear of complications can significantly affect their mental well-being. As Christians, there is an opportunity to provide support through prayer, congregational engagement and educational initiatives that promote understanding and compassion towards those living with diabetes.

Congregations can organize various activities aimed at raising awareness about diabetes. These may include:

- Hosting workshops that educate congregants about diabetes management, nutrition and lifestyle changes can empower individuals with knowledge and practical skills.
- Collaborating with local healthcare providers to offer free screenings for blood sugar levels can help identify undiagnosed cases.
- Highlighting healthy cooking practices can encourage families to prepare nutritious meals that are beneficial for managing diabetes.
- Establishing support groups within church communities can provide a safe space for individuals with diabetes to share experiences, challenges, and successes in managing their health.

As World Diabetes Day 2024 is observed under the theme “Breaking Barriers, Bridging Gaps,” The United Church in Jamaica and the Cayman Island Health and Wellness Task Force is encouraging us as a Christian community to take an active role in addressing this public health issue.

'LIVE IN G.L.O.W. MID-TERM CAMP AT JOHN GRAY MEMORIAL CHURCH

The John Gray Memorial Church hosted a Mid-Term Camp from October 21-25 under the theme Live in G.L.O.W. The camp provided a week of activities focused on spiritual growth, learning, and community-building for children on their school break. Through a combination of Bible lessons, creative workshops, outdoor games, and reflective sessions, the camp engaged children in understanding how to "G.L.O.W." by living in God's Love, Light of Jesus, with Open Hearts and Worshiping Together. A total number of 38 children were in attendance.



The camp concluded with a summary day where the children reviewed each lesson from the week. They created a collaborative "G.L.O.W. with God" mural and received tokens. A final presentation allowed children to showcase what they'd learned through dance and the messages written in handmade cards to the attendants of our Pantry Ministry.

HOPE AMIDST DISASTER:

Relief Efforts Support Rural Jamaican Communities Post-Hurricane Beryl

GLIMPSES OF THE RESILIENCE AND RECOVERY EFFORTS OF THOSE AFFECTED



In the wake of Hurricane Beryl, which struck Jamaica on July 3, 2024, rural communities in South Manchester and Southern St. Elizabeth faced unparalleled devastation. The storm's fierce winds and torrential rain left homes battered, crops destroyed, and many residents grappling with profound personal losses.

Among the hardest hit were the communities of Southern Manchester and St. Elizabeth, including Plowden, Marlie Hill, Alligator Pond and Hopewell, where many residents lost roofs, crop storage facilities, and livelihoods. For some, the damage was even more severe: one family in Hopewell lost a beloved sister, another saw their one-bedroom home reduced to rubble, and an elderly resident suffered a stroke during the chaos.




In response to this dire situation, Caribbean and North American Council for Mission (CANACOM) extended a lifeline, contributing JMD 450,000, and the Jamaica Ecumenical Mutual Mission (JEMM) provided 75 grocery packages for families. The Southern Regional Mission Council of the United Church mobilized swiftly, channeling this generosity into tangible aid. Food packages stocked with non-perishable essentials—canned proteins, beans, starches, and toiletries—were distributed to approximately 107 families across these communities.

These packages, while simple, were invaluable to families navigating the hurricane's aftermath, especially as many were without electricity for weeks. The non-perishable nature of the supplies meant food security was maintained even as basic utilities were slowly restored.

Beyond immediate relief, the impact of these efforts stretched further. The storm disrupted agricultural and small business activities, cutting off vital income sources for many. The contributions from JEMM and CANACOM were timely contributions bridging the crucial gap between initial disaster response and long-term recovery.

THE PACKAGES WHICH WERE DISTRIBUTED WERE WELCOMED.



PLOWDEN AND MARLIE HILL RELIEF SUMMARY:

- Families Assisted: 16
- Individuals Supported: Approximately 51
- Aid Provided: Food packages with essentials, offering critical sustenance amid widespread roof damage and crop loss.

HOPEWELL RELIEF EFFORTS:

- Families Assisted: 16 (each with 3 to 5 members)
- Aid Provided: Similar food packages, supporting residents facing severe crop loss, structural damage, and profound personal hardships.

ALLIGATOR POND

- Families Assisted: 75 (each with 3 to 5 members)
- Aid Provided: Similar food packages, supporting residents facing severe crop loss, structural damage, and profound personal hardships.

The resilience shown by these communities, coupled with the outpouring of support from organizations like CANACOM, has brought renewed hope. As families work to rebuild, the generosity displayed will be remembered as a beacon during a dark time.

The Southern Regional Mission Council and the residents of Plowden, Marlie Hill, Alligator Pond and Hopewell express heartfelt gratitude for the support that has enabled them to begin the difficult journey of recovery. Additionally, in partnership with the Samaritan's Purse, the SRMC distributed tarpaulin and solar lamps that served over 50 persons in communities.

Over the period, trainees participated in various activities with an aim to refine each trainee with teamwork, co-ordination and an all-round strengthening of each individual. They do believe in making the best use of opportunities presented and wish to excel in each skill area.



Trainees from the different departments were invited to an Open Day at Frome, sponsored by The Ministry of Labor and Social Security, they were able to showcase their skills to patrons in Manicure, Pedicure and Facial make-up services. Food preparation and pastries were displayed, and some persons were able to partake of the food that was prepared by the trainees. It was indeed a very proud moment for them to be a part of such an activity.



Several trainees from the Hospitality Service Villa and Other Properties are now placed in hotels and restaurants on Work Experience. This kind of experience is important for trainees to be aware of the rules and regulations and how to maintain standard procedures set out by organization in which they will be trained.



Devotional Exercises are conducted every second and fourth Thursday of each month by members of the Negril United Church with the aim to help trainees start their day with purpose and to keep them focused on the Word of God.

WRMC UCYPF Youth Social

On October 26 2024, the executive body of the Western Regional Mission Council United Church Young People's Fellowship (WRMC UCYPF) hosted its Youth Social at the Falmouth United Church. Over 40 youths were registered for the event from the following churches: Lucea United, Savanna-la-mar United, Barrett Town United, Lilliput United, Runaway Bay United, St. Paul's United, Mt. Hermon United, Big Bridge United, Friendship United and Carlisle Memorial United.

Approximately 60 persons attended the social. After registration and devotion, youths were engaged with fun-filled activities such as bible games, card games, board games and dominoes. Additionally, various prizes, such as notepads, pens, markers and tracts for participation were given to the youths. Before, the event closed the vote of thanks, introduction of the new steering committee executive body and final presentations of prizes were done. Rev. L. Young, the youth minister, concluded the event with the closing prayer and benediction.

WORSHIP THEMES FOR HOME AND OUR CONGREGATIONAL GATHERING

Sub- Theme for the Quarter

**Re-Ignited with the END in Sight - Evangelising and Nurturing for
Deepened Faith Walk**

26th Sunday after Pentecost

When we understand 'grace' as, 'unmerited divine assistance', or undeserved (divine) favour, we note that 'Christ had offered for all time a single sacrifice for sins ... [and] has perfected for all time those who are sanctified.' It is this grace that propels us forward in purpose to fulfil God's will for our lives, as we 'hold fast to the confession of our hope without wavering'.

Invite folks to consider another aspect of God's grace, as outlined in Samuel's story. Recognize that we cannot separate the lives of Samuel from that of David, as they are both intricately intertwined. Inasmuch as David is the long-term fruit of Ruth's faith in Naomi's YHWH, Samuel (asked him of the Lord) can be seen as the fruit of the persistence of his mother, Hannah. Nevertheless, both men, critical to the future of Israel, the fledgling nation, were visible testaments to God's purpose being fulfilled, and proof of God's promises.



END POINT: As you read for sermon prep, consider where the hand of God is visible in Hannah's story. What does grace look like for someone who is downcast and despairing, despite their confession of faith? Note that there is a personal element to grace, though it is freely offered by God. Moreover, we guard against mistaking the vessel for the Giver. When Eli misunderstood Hannah's state of lamentation as drunkenness, she had to explain herself. Nevertheless, his pronouncement that her prayer would be answered was a vocalization of God's gift to her. This is the kind of grace that one theologian describes as 'power for living' (see <https://www.desiringgod.org/interviews/what-is-grace>) Invite congregants to identify where they need power for life today, and encourage them to find it in God through Christ Jesus.




